**MISSION OF MERCY**  
**MINISTRY TO THE WHOLE MAN**

After the parting of the Red Sea, we read in Exodus 15:1-2 – “Then sang Moses and the children of Israel this song unto the Lord, and spoke, saying, I will sing unto the Lord, for he hath triumphed gloriously: the horse and his rider hath he thrown into the sea. (2)The Lord is my strength and song, and he is become my salvation: he is my God, and I will prepare him an habitation; my father’s God, and I will exalt him”.

And then in summary in verses 11 and 13 – “Who is like unto thee, O Lord, among the gods? Who is like thee, glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders?” (13)“Thou in thy mercy hast led forth the people which thou hast redeemed: thou hast guided them in thy strength unto thy holy habitation.”

Our recent trip to Africa was truly a “Mission of Mercy”. There is no other explanation for how God led us, other than by his mercy. Our group set up a home base tent covering under a tree which was on the plane, convenient to two IDP (Internally Displaced Persons) Camps. People in these temporary rag-tag shelters were forced at gun point or knife to abandon their homes during the election/tribal conflict and war that threatened to destroy the nation in December of 2007. We reached out to these people providing preaching and teaching, medical services – including testing for HIV/AIDS, counseling and prayer, and food, including packages of flour and grain. It was truly a ministry to the whole man, as you can see from the pictures! Our group of nine were accompanied by the Kijabe Medical team throughout our time in Kenya as well as Pastor Samuel Kahura and Evangelist Jefferson Kabiro and their associates from the Cistern Materials Ministry that we have worked with before.

110 people got saved as we moved in ministry. 64 were saved at the Thika Government prison and 18 at the Naivasha prison, one of the largest in Kenya. At the IDP Camps we went to where the people were and reached out to them with a message of hope and encouragement. 15 were saved at one location and 13 at another. These will be followed up by a Pastor who accompanied us and who sets up with Jeff every Sunday under the same tree where we were located.

As I entered one of the make-shift tents I was received by a beautiful, cultured, educated, and quality looking woman. She was sitting on a stool (the only furniture in her tent). Her legs were covered with dirt and grime and she had no shoes. There was no food or water, and only a mat on the dirt for her to sleep on. She had five children, who were by this time in clothes that were tearing apart and falling off of them. Her husband was in a far away city trying to find casual labor work so that he could send for his displaced family.

This scene touched my heart deeply and every time I think about it, I cry. She was a saved woman with a deep love for Jesus in her eyes and my heart went out to her in great compassion. Jesus said in Luke 21:12, referring to his followers – “But before all these, they shall lay their hands on you, and persecute you, delivering you up to the synagogues, and into prisons....”.

With a deep heart of compassion for the unsaved Jews that Jesus came first for, far beyond anything that touches our own hearts, Jesus said in Luke 13:34 – “O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, which killest the prophets, and stonest them that are sent unto thee; how often would I have gathered thy children together, as a hen doth gather her brood under her wings, and ye would not!”

We cannot solve all the injustices of the world. We cannot feed all the hungry or dispense medical services to all in need. We cannot pry open hard hearts as we always find in European countries and we cannot force the Gospel on anyone.

What we can do, however, is to keep ourselves right before God and pray that in our own weakness, Jesus, through his loving kindness and tender mercy, will somehow lead, and guide, and direct us for his purposes.

I see our orphans and disadvantaged kids at New Dawn and I realize that they came from similar circumstances as what we saw in the IDP Camps. What a tremendous thing it was to see again what God has wrought. Praise the Lord and thank you Jesus for what you have done to save these children from destruction.

Also, during our trip Pastor Ron Sukut and our son, George, went to New Dawn and constructed a full court, cement floor, basketball court, which was finished with backboards, rims, lining and all, just the night before we left. What a joy it was to see the kids playing basketball for the first time – it looked more like “let’s gather up on the one that has the ball”!

Please pray for Kenya at this critical time. The whole country is suffering from a one year drought. The corn is less than a foot tall in most areas. Please pray also for a new copy machine at New Dawn - \$3,000; 5 greenhouses for growing tomatoes, cucumbers, and beans - \$5,000; Bibles for the Naivasha prison – up to \$20,000; more monthly financial supporters for the new class at New Dawn - \$30-\$60/mo.

Thank you so much for all that you are doing to continue the great work that God has begun at New Dawn Community and with our outreach ministry teams in East Africa.
